A Letter From The Pastor


Shape the Future

The gifts and Christian materials, lovingly handpicked and wrapped, were collected by the parents/caregivers on



December 11th. Each child received a variety of materials sharing the message of the Good News and Great Joy of the birth of our Savior, Jesus Christ. Matthew 13:8 tells us that some of the seeds we sow fall on good soil where they produce a crop! Mollie Cressey, the school liaison, wrote "We are so grateful for everything that you and the people at Amelia Plantation Chapel do for our families. You all have blessed so many and sowed many seeds."

The Holy Spirit directed our daily efforts. A new miracle blossomed every day. What a joy it was to be at the distribution center when the parents arrived—to see their grateful expressions and sweet smiles. With the donation of 16 bikes from the Omni and tune-ups by Fernandina Beach Cycles, 35 bikes and gear now have new homes. Beyond the basic shoes, shirts and pants, a mountain of special requests were filled. Thank you to Regina who translated for the Spanish families. A Nassau teacher helped by shopping for six more children whose families registered for HCMI just days before Christmas. I'm so grateful for the work of our entire team!

One of the parents wrote "thank you for giving us help and hope at Christmas time!" Another wrote "this makes a huge difference in my daughter's life, from feeling like she's not all that wanted to feeling overwhelmed with Love." And yet another wrote "If it wasn't for you my kids wouldn't have a Christmas. It really means the world to me." One of our callers learned of a HCMI family member who is in the military in the Middle East. She and her husband asked how they could help, and sent him a love-filled Christmas package! God works in wonderful ways!

Thank you to our Chapel Family, Carlton Dunes, Isle de Mai, neighbors, friends, and family who joined in-47 donors and 85 workers-compassionately responding to the needs of others!

She graduated from Liberty University with a BS in Multi-Disciplinary Studies (Education and Psychology) and a Master of Education in Teaching and Learning. She is also a certified life coach and biblical counselor, and it's her joy to serve those who struggle with eating disorders through Bring Your Brokenness, a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization that she founded in 2018. She currently serves as the CEO of Bring Your Brokenness and as Executive Director at The Charis House, a nonprofit residential treatment center for adult women with eating disorders. Amie is looking forward to her time with us in February and plans to share her testimony and recovery story, help us understand more about eating disorder recovery, and tell us what God is doing through the ministry of Bring Your Brokenness. Unshakable

Hebrews 12: 28-29 Therefore let us be grateful for receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, and thus let us offer to God acceptable worship, with reverence and awe: for our God is a consuming fire.



There is a lot going on in the world right now. Each of us has pondered the thought of what our nation and world is going to look like in the future. Every generation asks these same questions. While none of us has the answers, we can take comfort in knowing how the story ultimately ends with Christ on the throne.

This passage above from Hebrews acknowledges that every civilization will cease to exist one day. Like so many of them already have, they will either fall before Jesus returns or they will fall when He returns. God's kingdom is the only one that "cannot be shaken."

Relationships, our health, careers, possessions, and hobbies/interests all captivate much of our time and attention. Each of these can be true blessings in our lives, but they will likely be "shaken" at some point. They each need to be held in proper balance with a kingdom mindset or we risk their becoming idols that compete with our devotion to God.

Idols are takers. They drain us. They offer promise but ultimately fail to deliver what we expect from them. What they do deliver comes with diminishing returns. We'll eventually need more than they can provide before moving on to something else offering even greater deceptions.

On the other hand, if we steward each of these as gifts from God, they fulfill His intended purpose in our lives. Godly stewardship helps us recognize the true source of these gifts. Each of them is to be enjoyed and preserved for His glory. We worship the Giver, not the gifts.

To what are we unhealthily clinging that is "shakable" in our lives? Matthew 7:24-27 compares the wise man who built his house on the "rock" versus the foolish man who built his house on the shifting sand. To build "on the rock" means that we will be hearing and responding disciples of Christ. We weather the storms of life through faith and obedience because our house is on the solid foundation of God's unshakable Kingdom.

Climate Change

Today, nothing that man does or doesn't do will have any significant effect on the world's climate. Significant reductions in particulate pollution have already occurred and have



acceptable cost/benefit ratios. I can remember the street lights being on in Pittsburgh at noon in 1944 when the steel mills were going full blast during WWII. We have found cost effective ways to deal with particulate pollution, but trying to control carbon dioxide emissions has reached the point of diminishing return. Today's environmentalism is one of the biggest "scientific" hoaxes in human history.

While it is true that increasing atmospheric carbon dioxide levels cause terrestrial warming, the effect is minuscule and only one of many factors and not the determining factor affecting climate. Earthly temperatures are affected by multiple factors including sun spot activity, precipitation, humidity, winds and ocean currents, topography, latitude and elevation. Mount Pinatubo in the Philippines is an active volcano that erupted in 1991 sending tons of volcanic ash into the atmosphere that resulted in blocking the sun's rays causing cooling of the earth's climate for 3 years.

Climate is even more complicated than indicated above. The most recent grand solar minimum occurred during the Maunder Minimum of 1645-1710, which led to reduction of solar radiation by 0.22% from the modern one and a decrease of the average terrestrial temperature by 1.0-1.5 degrees Centigrade. Interestingly, the Sun's magnetic field flips from pole to pole every 11 years and grand solar minima occur every 350 to 400 years. We're due for another Maunder Minimum to begin around the middle of the current century with a period of global cooling as the result.

Environmentalism, led by Western elites, denies third world countries in Africa, South America and elsewhere the tools to reduce their endemic poverty. Fossil fuels are the most efficient way to lift them out of poverty. God conceived, created, sustains and controls the natural world. Fossil fuels are part of God's plan for his people.

Furthermore, the mining of lithium for electric vehicle batteries is not a solution since it pollutes water sources, produces large scale mining waste and wastes millions of gallons of water while incidentally releasing large amounts of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere.

So my friends, believe in God who conceived, created, and controls the natural world as well as the spiritual world. The only climate that we need to worry about is the internal climate in our hearts and minds. We need an internal climate that is receptive to God's Word as Jesus tells us in the parable of the Sower in Matthew 13: 3-9.
